The BAFTSS Special Interest Groups (SIGS) scheme began in December 2016 and currently consists of 18 groups, each exploring connections and approaches to distinct areas of film, television and screen studies. The SIGS propose discipline-specific panels to the BAFTSS Annual Conference and arrange a variety of other activities, from the *Euro-Bollywood Workshop: Deconstructing Complexities* symposium to events on *FS74 – A (London) Film Society Reconstruction* and on *British Women Amateur Filmmakers and Colour Film.* BAFTSS SIGS have organised workshops that explore methodologies utilised in screen industries research and those that examine the relationship between filmmaking, practice research and the Academy. The work of the SIGs includes PGR and ECR training events, public lectures, and the *Notes on Colour* blog. To join or convene a SIG you must be a member of BAFTSS - there is an option to join one or more SIGS through the BAFTSS subscription process.




