## **BAFTSS 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference 2024**

Call For Papers: BAFTSS 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference. 'Labour and Screen Media', University of Sussex, Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> – Friday 5<sup>th</sup> April 2024. This conference focuses on all aspects of the relationship between labour and screen media, historically and today, from representations of labour on screen to the varied ways that labour — viewed as work, craft, skill, creativity, or exploitation — underpins screen media and screen industries. Issues related to labour are increasingly recognised as of central importance to film, television and screen studies. Almost all films and television represent worlds in which various forms of work are necessary, and while they present most obviously the dramatic labour of their actors, and are understood as the artistic works of directors or writers, all productions are dependent on many and various workers, whose labour has until recently often gone uncredited. And as recent strikes in the United States by SAG-AFTRA remind us, questions of labour, politics, and workforce precarity are live issues that demand our attention, particularly in the age of Al and digital content provision. We are seeking abstracts for individual papers and pre-convened panels that expand our understanding of labour across film, practice-based research, television, and other screen media. Deadline: 15<sup>th</sup> December 2023.

BAFTSS French and Francophone Screen Studies SIG: report that 'On Saturday 14th October 2023, the BAFTSS French and Francophone Cinema SIG joined forces with the journal French Screen Studies and Warwick University's School of Modern Languages and Cultures to host the Study Day 'French Screen Comedy from the Coming of Sound to the SVOD era'. The day's programme saw visitors from Europe as well as different UK institutions admire Warwick's new Faculty of Arts Building, including representatives from the Basque Country to Montpellier via several from Paris. Notable here was the fascinating keynote by Sorbonne-Nouvelle-Paris 3's Raphaëlle Moine about contemporary comedies centralising older people, drawn from a major international project on representing ageing in European audiovisual fictions. Other topics ranged from post-war star figures such as Louis de Funès to parodies on social media platforms, with gender, race and class providing master themes. Q&As and breaks were particularly lively and it was great to see several senior colleagues as well as students in attendance merely to listen, from Warwick as well as further afield. Meanwhile, the unexpectedly sun-drenched 'penthouse suite' boasted impressive views and altogether the day was an invigorating way to get into gear early in the academic year, and carve out a space for research during the busy teaching period. The organisers Mary Harrod (Warwick) and Ginette Vincendeau (KCL) thank all involved and most particularly BAFTSS, French Screen Studies and Warwick for between them enabling us to provide free food, refreshments and even travel bursaries allowing many early career researchers to attend alongside veteran scholars. 

BAFTSS Amateur Cinema SIG and Archives and Archival Methods SIG worked with the Women in Focus team for a collaborative online event to share outcomes of the *Women in Focus* research project. The event was titled 'Back into Focus: How to Make Women Filmmakers More Visible in the Archives' and took place on Tuesday, 21 November 2023. The event was organised around the following problematic: 'It is common knowledge that the work of women amateur filmmakers is routinely hidden or obscured in film archives and archive records. But why did this happen – and what can be done to tackle this problem?' The Women in Focus project team presented their research into existing archival collections of largely unknown women amateur filmmakers. The team used a series of case studies from their research that identify significant gaps in knowledge at the level of cataloguing, accession records, historical research, and metadata – to show how adopting feminist methodologies allowed them to challenge existing practices and bring a wide range of women filmmakers back into focus. The event was joined by the 'Women in Focus: Developing a Feminist Approach to Film Archive Metadata and Cataloguing' project Team: Dr Sarah Arnold (Maynooth University), Professor Keith M. Johnston (University of East Anglia) and Dr Carolann Madden (Maynooth University).

- promote the training of postgraduate students in research;
- give researchers and practitioners the opportunity to attend and present a paper at the annual BAFTSS conference.
